
Testing for Water Quality

Water quality in our Pelican Group of Lakes is above average. In summary, that was the report presented to those attending the PGOLID annual meeting in August.

For the past year, the lake coordinator hired by PGOLID has been testing the lakes periodically. The testing discovered an unfavorable weed called Curlyleaf Pond Weed, which was caught early in its development and successfully treated. The 2007 budget includes funding for the lake coordinator to continue his work, testing for water quality and watching for any potential problems on our lakes.

In other action at the meeting Vance Stueness, Lisa Wheeler and Jonal Uglem were elected to serve three year terms on the board.

About 50 residents of our Pelican Group of lakes attended the annual meeting on August 19th.



Planning Ahead

Highway Projects Discussed

The plan to re-route two highways on the north and west sides of Pelican Lake are moving up on the list of Ottertail County construction projects.

Plans to reroute Hwy 9 are included in the county's recently developed Six-Year Plan. A redesigned Hwy 20 would come later.

As proposed, Hwy 9 would move to the west near the Rolling Hills Golf Course, then turn east near Cormorant Village. (See the map, page 2)

Assistant Ottertail
County Engineer Charles
Grotte said the changes are
being proposed because
currently lake cottages are
too close to Hwy 9 as it
curves east around the lake
and then swings north again
at the Zorbaz corner. These are
congested traffic areas with
dangerous curves, he said.

Six Years Later

The *next* Six-Year Plan would likely include moving a two mile stretch of Hwy 20 which also has high traffic and some homes close to the road. The two miles of highway would be moved (continued on page 2)

about ³/₄ of a mile north of where it is now, and would connect with the reconstructed Hwy 9 on the west end.

The current Hwy 20 would then become a lake road used primarily by residents on the north shore of that two mile stretch of the lake.

Grotte said the timing of these projects depends on the availability of Minnesota highway funds and the costs of construction, which continue to climb. The two projects would be paid for by the state with no special assessments



Going to Court

The fight to stop the proposed Echo Bay development on Fish Lake continues. As this issue of *The Pelican Brief* was going to press, Pelican Lake area residents opposed to the project were going to court. The attorney representing lake residents, Tami Norgard, asked a judge to overrule an Ottertail County Board decision that says an environmental impact statement isn't necessary. It could be several weeks before the judge rules.

Referred to as a *cluster development*, the Echo Bay project would include construction of 209 homes with 60 boat docks if it gets the go ahead from the court. For a closer look at the proposed development check the web site at **www.echobaymn.com**.

The Pelican Lake Property Owners Association which is opposed to the Echo Bay project because of its scope and potential environmental impact, reminds residents that the legal fund is entirely separate from PLPOA dues. 

Update on Area Development Plans

Work will begin soon to clear buildings and debris from the former Crystal Pierz Marine property on the west end of the lake to make way for a small development of condominiums.

Developer Dell Arneson and his partners in this project (all Pelican Lake residents), are making plans for the 77 acres they purchased this summer. In a meeting with the Executive Board of the Pelican Lake Property Owners Association, Arneson said early plans call for approximately 50 residential units to be built, a combination of twin homes and town home buildings. Each unit will be between 1300 and 1600 square feet, with lake views and garages. Road access will be to the back of the buildings. Boat slips will be available in a similar configuration to the current Crystal Pierz set up.

The Pelican Lake Property Owners Association unanimously approved a statement saying it does not object to the development of this property as it is being proposed.

Zucchini Bars	

From the kitchen of: **Connie Horn**

Bake: Blend: Put in greased jelly roll pan and 3 eggs, beaten 2 cups of sugar 1 cup of oil cool after baking. Add & Mix: Frosting: 1 TBS. Vanilla

2½ cups of flour 1/4 tsp of baking power 1 tsp baking soda 2 cups of grated zucchini *

(*Connie says: Do not peel the zucchini. Use medium to large zucchini and just grate the outer portions of the vegetable using a medium sized grater. Discard the seeds or core.)

Then Stir In:

1 cup of chopped walnuts and ³/₄ cup of raisins (optional) (Pelican Point)

bake at 350° for 20 minutes, (check @ 15 min.) and allow to

8 oz. cream cheese 2-3 TBS. butter

3½-4 cups powdered sugar

Note:

If you want bars all winter you can freeze the grated zucchini in the oil. When ready to use add the thawed oil and zucchini mixture to the sugar and eggs before adding the flour mixture. Baked bars also freeze very well.

Grilled Corn on the Cob

6 ears of corn with husks

1 TBS melted butter

1 TBS virgin olive oil

½ tsp salt

1/4 tsp black pepper

1/4 tsp cayenne pepper juice of half of lime

1. Prepare the grill.

2. Place corn in cold water and soak for 20 minutes

3. Combine butter and remaining ingredients in a small bowl

4. Pull husks back from corn and remove the silks. Brush corn with butter mixture. Wrap husks back around each ear of corn. Grill about 16 minutes

Serve with a lime wedge (optional).
