

Monitoring Our Lakes

The PGOLID Water Resource Coordinator, Moriya Rufer, collects water samples from Pelican, Little Pelican, Bass and Fish lakes every other week between May and September. These water samples are analyzed for water clarity, phosphorus (which is food for plants and algae), and chlorophyll-a, which is a measurement of algae concentration. Overall, the water quality for 2007 matched historical averages.

Septic and Holding TANK MAINTENANCE

How to prevent impact to Pelican Lake and how often to pump your tank

May 30, 7:30pm PLPOA Spring Meeting Fair Hills

Get results from the Septic System & Holding Tank study that was conducted last year at the May 30th seminar. The program will consist of a short presentation recapping the septic study and a Septic System designer/installer will talk about maintenance, cost and pumping. A short break will then be followed by a question and answer period. Handouts will include a list of tank pumpers in the area with prices and worksheets for calculating cleaning frequency.

Shoreline MANAGEMENT

How to make your shoreline both beautiful and functional

June 5, 7-8:30pm Cormorant Town Hall

Attendees will learn what plants to establish on their shoreline that will be both beautiful and functional for water quality. There will be examples of garden designs, plant lists and local nursery contact information. This seminar will consist of short presentations by a DNR Shoreline expert and the PGOLID Water Resource Coordinator, a short break and then question and answers and hands-on. Those of you who attend this seminar will also be able to apply for the Shoreline Habitat Restoration Grant program for the DNR to receive funds to help with shoreline restoration on your property.



SHORELINE RESTORATION GRANT FUNDS AVAILABLE

f you're thinking about fixing up your shoreline, you may be eligible for some funds to help you.

The Pelican Group of Lakes Improvement District (PGOLID) was awarded a Shoreline Restoration Grant by the DNR this year and it has some money to distribute.

The purpose of the DNR Shoreline Habitat Program is to improve the quality of shoreline habitat, to expand the diversity and abundance of native aquatic and terrestrial plants, and to enhance and protect water quality in Minnesota's lakes and streams

There is enough funding to cover the restoration of the shoreline of approximately three properties and a couple of workshops on shoreline restoration. The focus of these projects must be on reestablishing vegetation for fish and wildlife habitat and funds cannot be used for rock riprap stabilization or permanent wave breaks.

Grant participants must restore at least 75% of the frontage on their property, and can leave 25% free to access their dock. Also, the native plant buffer needs to extend at least 25 feet back from the shoreline.

The DNR will help with the planning, design and plants. The participant gets to decide what the final look is, as long as the guidelines are followed on how much area needs to be restored.
