Muskie Update

In a couple of days paid PLPOA members will receive our muskie survey email.

We are asking one member from each paid membership to take this survey, so we can approach legislative leaders, local government, and the MNDNR to stop stocking muskie in Pelican Lake.

Our basic objections to muskie stocking are:

- 1 Muskie are not native to Pelican Lake.
- 2 Less than 2 % of voting Minnesotans fish for muskie

3 Muskie are native to 21 % of MN fishable lake waters, and major (uncounted) rivers like the Mississippi, St. Croix, Rainy etc). Muskie fisherman now have more than 35 % of MN fishable waters to fish for this 13th ranked fish in popularity.

4 Muskie are very expensive to stock (third most in stocking spending in MN). Up to 8 times more money is spent per year on muskie stocking and management in Pelican than is spent on walleye stocking and management by the MNDNR.

5 The minimum keep size for muskie is over 54 inches long and many people are very uncomfortable with that size of predator fish. Several muskie bites have been reported on Pelican Lake, and some lake residents refuse to swim, and many are worried about kids and grandkids.

6 While the effects on other sport fishing (sunfish, crappies, walleye, pike etc.) are debatable and subject to many variables, the bottom line is look at other lakes in that area that do not have muskie. Our ice fishing (and open water fishing) numbers are a fraction of other local lakes that do not have muskie.

7 Lakes that have had muskie introduced are up to 4 times more likely to have AIS (ZM, Eurasian Milfoil, Starry Stonewort, Faucet Snails). The aggressive and unprotected statewide (and nationwide) "lake hopping" by muskie fisherman puts our lake at additional AIS risk.

8 Management of our fisheries is supposed to involve fisherman, citizens, and property owners. The aggressive "bully tactics" by the MNDNR and muskie promoters is what allowed muskie stocking to occur on Pelican without first a "promised public hearing", and "without the approval of PLPOA".

9 We are not saying there are no other sport fish in Pelican Lake, we are saying we would like to be a "World Class Walleye Lake", not a world class muskie lake..

County 9 July Update

Good news! The Otter Tail County Engineer has advised the Association that all work on the driveway entrances, the road base and this year's first layer of tar road surface on County 9 from South Pelican Drive to the Becker County Line will be completed by July 25th. No more layers of dirt and dust, and no more trips to the temporary mail boxes!

More good news! After 15 years of continuing effort by Association Members Gary Hart and Denny Tollefson, the Scambler Township Board at its July 13th meeting unanimously approved paving Duck Lake Road from County 9 to the Becker County Line yet this year. This is long sought good news for our members and all Scambler residents.

Protect Our Loon Population

The Loon, the beautiful, beloved state bird of Minnesota, could be in danger. According to a recent article reported by MPR News, researchers who have been tracking the movement of loons throughout the state have found a connection between BP and our state bird.

Seven years ago, BP had an oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico. Scientists found that in 2010, loons were diving all the way to the bottom of the water where the oil would have settled. The oil gets into the bird's feathers, blood and their eggs that are laid the following spring and the contaminants are being

brought back to Minnesota. MORE



AED Availability in Pelican Lakes Region

Remember the discussion about placing AED (Automated External Defibrillators - that will shock you if you have a heart attack) around the lake? Well, after much discussion PGOLID has determined that it might be more advantageous to have the residents purchase one and have it available on your beach, or your neighborhood, or simply for your own use if needed in an emergency. The good news is that Peg Severson, a PGOLID board member, has done some research and found a source that would allow us to purchase used AED's (but rarely used) unit for \$560.00 each. The source would give us a 2 year warranty on the unit and a 4 year warranty on the battery along with one set of adult electrodes. The unit potentially could outlast the battery and a new battery is \$365.00. So, all in all, it is a very cost effective method of placing one in you home or neighborhood. DNR Warns Lakeshore Property Owners Equipment To Remove Aquatic Plants Illegal

ST. PAUL -- Minnesota's Department of Natural Resources reminds lakeshore property owners that it is illegal to use hydraulic jets to move sediment or excavate the bottom of a lake or to uproot aquatic plants in public waters.

"Aquatic plants are incredibly important for keeping water clean and fish populations healthy," said Jon Hansen, aquatic plant management consultant. "We want everyone to enjoy our lakes, and misusing hydraulic jets not only destroys fish habitat but leaves a cloud of sediment and degrades the water for everyone else."
